




THE RETREAT FROM SILIVI—The Turkish 4th Army Corps after the disastrous retreat from Lule Burgas retired through Chorlu and Kuilkli, and from the latter place on to Silivi. The Turkish commander halted for a couple of days in the town to collect his scattered troops and concentrate the different brigades of his command. On the approach, however, of the 6th division of the 3rd Bulgarian Army Corps, the 4th Turkish Army Corps' commander decided to fall back on to the high ground at Hademkeni. For a long time the retreating troops suffered from hunger rather than kill the sheep which they encountered in their flight. Eventually, however, they overcame their repugnance to the strong and disagreeable flesh of these animals, which are reared solely for their merino wool, and the above picture shows a party of soldiers guarding a herd of sheep which they had commandered. they had commandeered.



TWENTY YEARS A SERVANT OF ROYALTY

HE late Mr. Lewis, of the Mili-tary Stores Departm€nt, Que-bec, who died recently in the Ancient Capital, was a splendid type of the Irish gentleman, al-beit he was endowed with all the fighting qualities of the brilliant Celt. When but a mere boy, he enlisted in e army and saw service with hi egiment in many stirring battles in efence of the colors. While yet th defence of the colors. While yet the handsome, romantic, young Irishman, Mr. Lewis was named orderly to the late Lord Dufferin, Governor-Genéral of Canada, one of whose sons Mr. Lewis had saved at the risk of his own life from a watery grave at Gaspe. He was appointed to the retinue of the Marquis of Lorne and H.R.H. the Princess Louise, with whom he became a genuine favorite. On arri-val in Quebec of H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught, brother of the Princess Louise, Mr. Lewis was commanded to appear before His Royal Highness. Mr. Lewis was, however, unable to respond to the call, as he was then lying at death's door in the Hotel Dieu Hospital, Quebec.

As an inventor, Mr. Lewis was best cnown for his "Lewis Military Equip-nent," for which he was commended the greatest army men in the Brit sh Empire. Always and everywhere an ardent

loquent supporter of Home Rule, his leep religious spirit never permitted nim to waver for a moment in his de-cotion to his legitimate superiors. For
